Caythorpe and Fulbeck LIVES responders

As there are a number of LIVES responders currently living in the village, I thought it might be interesting to write a bit more about the LIVES organisation, what the Charity's aims are, and a bit more about the role of the responders.

LIVES was set up in 1970 and was initially run by a couple of GPs based in Horncastle. Since then, the charity has grown tremendously, attracting a wide range of volunteers from medics and paramedics, to complete novices with no previous medical experience.

While LIVES HQ is based in Horncastle, they have responders dotted across the whole county, including North and North East Lincolnshire. They have around 500 active responders who could be called to duty in the event of a major emergency- the last such call was to support flood victims near Wainfleet: or alternatively, be asked to log on duty when the ambulance service is experiencing a high call volume.

LIVES (Lincolnshire Integrated Voluntary Emergency Services) is a charitable based organisation, which is dependent on locally sourced funding. Its aim is to support an 'army of highly trained and dedicated volunteers who get to their neighbours fast to deliver initial care in those first critical moments of a medical emergency'.

The organisation has diversified since set up: it specializes in training, particularly around First Aid, Health and Safety, Moving and Handling, and Mental Health First Aid courses, plus courses for its Responders at various levels of competence. It also specialises in pre-hospital Emergency care, with specialized teams providing Emergency care at home to avoid hospital admissions, Medics who are skilled at responding to and treating patients at Road Traffic Collisions, and there is also a Falls Response team which responds to calls for assistance when a patient falls at home. Two of these have now become commissioned services within Lincolnshire and have prevented around 2,000 unnecessary admissions to hospital, using alternative pathways to support patients staying at home.

The Responders have a variety of skills, from basic CPR plus some First Aid, to being able to maintain the airways in an unconscious patient and assist EMAS staff with assessments prior to admission to hospital. Most importantly, they are able to give support and reassurance to family members whilst waiting for an ambulance to arrive in an emergency situation.

The LIVES responders in Caythorpe and Fulbeck normally respond within an 8 mile radius. There are currently 3 Responders living in this area, plus another who helps with the cleaning and maintenance of defibrillators across this part of the county. This small number impacts on the amount of cover provided locally, which is normally 1-2 days a week.

We both joined LIVES around 5 years ago and have progressed from being First Responders with basic First Aid knowledge and Basic Life Support skills including CPR, to working full-time on one of the Falls Response vehicles (learning new skills at our age is always good!). Linda however, has been a LIVES responder for over 10 years, and regularly books 'on duty' for the area, so will be known to a lot of local people in this role, whilst husband Tony is the supporter who cleans and maintains the defibrillators.





Most Responders want to provide support for their local community, which is why we joined initially, and they also like to be involved in supporting Fundraising in their area, and to support local Gala days.

Look out for the new Emergency Care vehicles driven by the Falls and Emergency Care teams- resplendent in bright yellow and blue stripes.

Graeme Woods, Bois Art; a highly talented artist who works with all mediums but specialises in pastels, Lincolnshire views and pet portraits.

Katheryn and Trena, Sprinkled with Love, are bringing their candle making skills and their gorgeous gifts to Fulbeck.

Derek Williamson, Assynt Pens & Crafts, is our new resident woodturner, who produces large and small items on his lathes, and is going to also be offering. Woodturning courses and demonstrations in his unit.

The Store in the Coach House will be an ethically sourced retail space with gifts, crafts, cards, accessories and other goodies. The Store also will incorporate a new environmentally conscious food store, specialising in local products.

The aim is to provide courses in our newly refurbished training room in many different creative skills. The events of the last couple of years have created a great interest in learning new skills, particularly creative ones, we hope to meet this new 'need'. The first course will be an event creating a special flower arrangement for Mother's Day, more details to be announced shortly...

Fulbeck Craft Centre aims to be an original retail, learning and food experience within this visitor attraction. The centre is aiming to promote craft, craft production and artisanal skills in an ethical and environmentally responsible way.

20 mph Speed Limit Policy in Small Rural Villages by Iris Morison.

Over the past few months, the Parish Council and Cllr. Alex Maughan have been approached by Nigel Brown and myself to discuss reducing the speed of motorists on Rectory Lane and around the village. We understand the Speed Limit Policy is to be reviewed in 2022 and 20 mph in small rural villages will hopefully be considered.

I met Alex in December to walk around the village and discuss various options.

Speed Limit Policy - 20 mph through villages. Alex stated there are hundreds of villages in Lincs. who would like 20 mph but LCC do not have the funds. Many other county councils have managed to adopt the policy of 20 mph through small villages which makes sense for the safety, mental health and wellbeing of villagers. Also, Fulbeck must have priority as not many villages have narrow lanes with steep banks, no footpaths and blind driveways. As the LCC Highways Speed Limit Policy is being reviewed this Spring, I feel we should push strongly for 20 mph. At the present time LCC's policy is based on accidents/fatalities.

Speed Humps. Alex stated that he did not think these would be considered as suitable in a conservation village used by heavy farm equipment, particularly from a noise point of view.

Road Markings and Signs. Alex suggested that road markings work very well. The PC have asked for 30 mph roundels on the A607 as you enter the village from both directions some time ago and we are still waiting so I do not hold out much hope of a quick solution. We are also awaiting "Fulbeck" signs as you enter the village on Brant Road and South Heath Lane but, despite promises, we are still waiting.

I understand that this is on the Agenda for the Parish Council meeting on Monday, 7th March, 2022.

Report and Comment for the Newsletter on the Extraordinary Parish Council meeting held on

Monday 6th December 2021 by Iris Morison, reporter for Fulbeck Communications.

(This is not the Minutes of the P.C. Meeting which can be seen on the Village website.)

1. This meeting was to consider and approve the budget for the precept for the financial year 2022-2023 After discussion it was agreed that the precept be set at £8,774.

2, Also, for the election of chairman following the resignation of Cllr. Simon Caunt. Cllr. Ann Sampson was voted in as chairman which left a vacancy for vice-chairman. Cllr. David Morison was voted in as vice-chairman.

3, The Parish Clerk has also resigned and Mrs Carol Tointon, who has previously acted as Fulbeck Parish Clerk, has taken on the role temporarily until a new Parish Clerk is appointed,

Report on the Parish Council meeting held on Wednesday, 4th January 2022.

1.Vacancy for a new councillor following the resignation of Cllr. Caunt.

As ten people have requested an election, this will take place on the 17th Feb, 2022. Nominations should be made to SKDC by 21st Jan. Full details will be placed on the village website. Peter Langford of LALC has been appointed to set-up the website and he is very helpful and efficient. It was hoped that there would be other council elections at the same time so the costs could be split. Unfortunately, it appears this is not the case, and the P.C. will have to bear the full costs of approx. £2,000. It was therefore agreed to increase the precept by £1,000 to £9,774 (additional costs to be taken out of reserves). Last year's precept was set at £9,000.

2. Seat on High Street Village Green. This is not the time of year to install a new seat so it will be on the agenda for the March meeting.

3. 20 mph Speed Limit through the village. CC Alex Maughan and Iris Morison met to discuss this issue of speeding traffic on Rectory Lane and around the village as previously reported by Nigel Brown who sent his apologies (see separate report). It was agreed that Alex would contact Nigel Brown to discuss further.

4. New HGV signs and moving the 30 mph sign on Pottergate Road. CC Alex Maughan stated that this is being left until the bridge on Station Road, Caythorpe, which is owned by National Highways, has been repaired. It is unsafe for HGVs at present. He has a further meeting to discuss later this month.

5. Deer Warning Signs on the A17 in the area of Fane's Gorse. Cllr Morison had reported there had been several accidents recently involving collisions with deer and badgers with dead carcasses being left on the verge. CC Alex Maughan will report this to Highways and arrange for deer warning signs to be erected.

7. War Memorial on Stragglethorpe Lane. Cllr. Hodcroft reported that she has been in contact with Peter Hare who is replacing the damaged hedge and bushes with a small Yew hedge. This will cost £132. There is also the cost of painting the memorial. DC Penny Milnes stated she has some funds available which could be allocated to this project and will send the necessary grant application form. There has now been some fly tipping on the site, which has been reported.

8. Citizens Advice Consultation. Cllr. Hodcroft attended a very interesting Consultation. The CA South Lincs. has moved to Finkin Street and needs more volunteers urgently. Training will be given. Details to be placed on Facebook and in the Newsletter. Cllr Fane stated there are small Charity Funds in the village for people in need to cover illness, funerals, etc. and Collette Hughes, secretary, can be contacted.

9. Policy for dealing with matters between meetings. Cllr. Morison had circulated a model PC email policy, and this will be placed on the Agenda for the March meeting. Clerk will circulate details of an on-line course.

10. Collection Box for Aluminium Cans in the village car park. John Asher on behalf of the Rotary Club applied to the VH&PF committee to place a blue box with Rotary markings in the car park. This was agreed and it is now in place, together with one in the Hare & Hounds car park. Hopefully this will be well used by villagers and lots of money raised for charity.

11. D.C. Report – Planning Applications:

Not From the Rectory: In Journeyings Often

The report on BBC news last autumn of a family rescued from South Australia's remote outback after being stranded for four days when their campervan became bogged down in mud brought to mind a book which I had been reading by the Reverend G W Lovejoy and telling of the 5 years he had spent in the Australian Bush as a member of the Brotherhood of the Good Shepherd at Dubbo Today's family called for help but were told a land rescue could be weeks away due to flooding in the area and so with searing temperatures forecast, a rescue helicopter was sent in to fly the family out. No such rescues were possible in the 1930's/1940's!

Lovejoy entitled his book 'In Journeyings Often' in turn recalling St Paul's descriptions of his own missionary journeys in 2 Corinthians 11:26 The BGS ministered to an area of 67,000 square miles taking Word and Sacrament according to the rites of the Church of England to the people in the outback. Lovejoy was inspired to this ministry by the chance reading of 'A Parson in the Australian Bush' and in 1934 set out from Victoria station in London to Newhaven bound via Paris and Milan to Venice where he sailed via the Suez Canal for the Red Sea and the Indian Ocean eventually arriving in Sydney where he would travel on to Dubbo in the Diocese of Bathurst and eventually reach his destination at Brewarrina some 232 miles further on! Time was split between the town and the Bush and the small number of those attending the Sunday service after a Saturday evening dance made the writer reflect that here - as with us today 'Christ came to his own but his own received him not'. There was frequent trouble with car journeys being bogged down in mud – although a week's leave in Sydney held the promise of walking in the Blue Mountains and of surfing!

Back at Brewarrina the next Bush trip took 6 days to travel 76 miles due to getting bogged down in creeks after the rains! In a parish consisting of 18,000 square miles a Sunday service was something of a luxury and many churches in the bush would have only 2 Sunday visits per annum plus 8 week-day visits – Brewarrina saw their rector on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month with the time in between spent on travel in the Bush. The small number attending worship caused him much despair – of such services at Christmas or Good Friday he writes that 'nothing stirs in them' – it is 'just another day' – but here and there scattered about are pious and devout souls – 'God's remembrancers'On the wearing of the clerical collar when in the parish he says it conveys a message no matter who you meet – the Church is about and the Church is at work and as long as you wave – not necessarily stop – all's well – but wave you must for you are a Lord's Remembrancer!

Lovejoy's 5 years came to an end early in 1940 but, in the conclusion to his book, he wrote that a constant supply of priests is needed for the Brotherhood of the Good Shepherd carrying the Church's ministry to the people of the Australian Bush: the normal period of service was 3 or 5 years during which time priests agree to remain unmarried and to work on a stipend of £40 per annum plus their keep. Priests in England would get their passage paid to Australia at the outset and their passage home at the end of their period of service. Today the BGS is no more but you can read more in Neville Shute's novel 'In the Wet' where the narrator is a member of the Bush Brotherhood and provides a fictional account of the life of one of these itinerant priests who have been described as a band of men who could 'preach like apostles' and 'ride like cowboys'.
