NATURE NOTES

So where did Spring go? Here we are at the end of May with midsummer day only 3 weeks away and the temperature is more like in late April. A long dry period and now almost daily heavy showers (although not always as forecast) is as confusing to us as it is to nature.

Everything was slow to happen in "Spring" with Swallows and Martins only arriving in small numbers and widely scattered. The Swifts seem to be more abundant around the village than the Swallows and now suddenly everything is happening. Down every hedgerow there is a singing Common Whitethroat every two hundred metres or so with nearly as good a number of Yellowhammer. From nearly everywhere Chiffchaff, Willow Warbler and Blackcap can be heard and House Sparrows have been seen collecting nesting material, although later than usual. I haven't yet heard a Cuckoo although several have been heard around in this part of Lincolnshire. The Great Spotted Woodpecker has been heard drumming earlier in the spinney along Bulby Lane and two pairs of Wheatear have been seen on the old walls along the Viking way, with Skylarks finally filling the extensive Lincolnshire skies with their song on a rising flight. Linnets are often been seen along the hedgerows lining the heathland hedges.

Insect Life has, as expected, been slow to emerge and is still not as abundant as we may wish. There have been warm sunny days when the verges and gardens have seen a reasonable number of Butterflies – Red Admiral, Peacock, Small Tortoiseshell, Orange Tip, Brimstone and Small White have made fleeting appearances. The enigmatic Beefly was often seen early on and Queen Bumblebees are still seen searching the grassy verges for suitable nest sites. Solitary Bees have been very active on older stone walls constantly coming and going stocking up their nest holes with food supplies for their larvae before blocking the entrance with mud. The slower emergence of flying insects will have been the main reason for the late appearance of Swallows and Martins.

Plant life has followed a similar pattern and looked pretty dormant for a while but now with slightly warmer conditions and plenty of sun/rain everything is bursting forth. The wildflower plot in the Churchyard is showing great promise with a much greater number of Cowslip and Primrose than last year and with the promise of so much to come from Oxeye Daisy, Corn Cockle, Red Campion, Nettle-leaved Bellflower and Comphrey beginning to show well. We are just seeing the first Speedwell flowering in the verges to replace the delightful little Ground Ivy flowers, and Greater Celandine is now gracing grassy banks.

All in all a confusing picture but it looks like we are in for an interesting and fruitful Summer.

Not From the Rectory: A Month in which the Rector 'bounces back'

Heritage Railways appear to be benefitting from a government 'Bounce Back' scheme and we duly bought our 'Bounce Back' ticket entitling us to a whole compartment on the 11.15am departure one day in April from Wirksworth to Duffield on the Ecclesbourne Valley Railway. In truth this was trip down memory lane for often of a Saturday I would take mother out for a ride in the car and we covered this area of Derbyshire extensively, perhaps enjoying a picnic in the car park at Alport Heights looking over Wirksworth and then dropping down to the town to see the progress on bringing the railway back to life before eventually travelling on the line including most memorably a ride one year on the Santa Special

The line south would have joined the Midland main line at Duffield but the intention was to take the route north beyond Wirksworth and join the main line north of Rowsley thus by-passing a stretch of line owned by a rival company between Ambergate and Rowsley. As soon as the Midland Railway was able to, it took over the line from Ambergate and so Wirksworth became and remained a short branch line mainly for freight from the lead mines and limestone quarries; for milk from farms along the route and for a small but regular group of commuters

The last freight train in 1989 but the lines remained and the Ecclesbourne Valley Railway was formed to bring life back and today our handsome crimson red carriages were hauled by 'Eric' – A Class 14 diesel hydraulic locomotive built in 1965 at Swindon D9537 for shunting duties, latterly working for British Steel before retiring to the East Lancashire Railway but on loan to the EVR:

We can see in the pictures we took first the beautiful British Railways crest on the carriage side displaying a demi-lion rampant (the British lion) holding between the paws a silver locomotive wheel. The lion is issuant from a heraldic crown of gold on which are arranged the rose (for England), the thistle (for Scotland), the leek (for Wales) and the oak leaf (for all Great Britain) – and secondly a prospective purchaser of the 1967 beige Morris Minor parked at the station!

It is but a short journey to the National Trust property of Hardwick Hall where you can see the rector doing that which the bishops have instructed – taking some time to rest! We often combine this with a visit to the family grave taking flowers to replace the Christmas wreath

This letter will be coming out when the church calendar has moved forward into the Trinity season about which John Meade Faulkner [1858-1932] memorably wrote:

We have done with dogma and divinity,
Easter and Whitsun past,
The long, long Sundays after Trinity
Are with us at last;
The passionless Sundays after Trinity,
Neither feast-day nor fast!



Report for Newsletter on Annual Parish Meeting and Parish Council meeting by Zoom

Annual Parish Meeting

Chairman's Report 2020/2021 by Simon Caunt.

Chairman thanked villagers for their support during the Covid pandemic, especially Paul, Rick and Tina, and everyone else who stepped up to meet the challenge.

Our Parish Clerk is producing a new Website for the village and her email address is clerkffpc@gmail.com

All events were cancelled for the year apart from Remembrance Day when two minutes silence was held at the war memorial. Thanks to Josephine Marriott for arranging the poppies. Also, thanks to the Village Hall committee for the Christmas decorations. The village has pulled together re. the Gypsy site and thanks to Sue Tyler for her efforts.

The precept has been increased by 18% to cover contributions to the costs of resurfacing village car park, repairs to church/village clock, painting the bus shelter and a new notice board, plus an increase in clerk's hours to cover all extra matters. The chairman also thanked the Parish Councillors, District Councillor and the County Councillor.

2. P.C.C. Report by Julian Fane.

There has been no heating and no services until the first service in March by which time the heating and the clock were fixed. Churchwardens, Tony Kingston and Geoff Cottingham, do a huge amount of work behind the scenes. The church is open on a Wednesday for private prayer. It has been a very quiet year.

3. Village Hall Report by Peter Hughes

Due to the pandemic the village hall has been closed and therefore received no income, but government grants have helped the situation. The V.H. has contributed to the village car park, church/village clock, and given the Hall a refreshing coat of paint. Two new seats have been placed at the rear of the sports field to enjoy the view. A further dog poo bin has been ordered for the eastern boundary. The Sports Club has carried out intensive maintenance work on the sports field. The Hall will re-open on the 6th May as a Polling Station. Tai Chi classes will restart on the 19th May and car boot sales may resume in July.

4. Charities Report by Peter Hughes

Relief in Need. Income £1,801. Balance £5,794.96. Eight cash gifts have been made.

Relief in Sickness Fund. Income £71.63. Balance £1,085.15. No grants made.

Parish Council Meeting (following Annual Parish Meeting)

1. Highway matters. The entrance to Wards has been patched. South Heath Lane potholes have been reported.

2. Correspondence.

2.1. Play Park Gyrospiral. The parts are on order (from France) and hopefully this piece of equipment will be in place by the end of the month. Any new equipment on the playing field needs to be discussed with the Village Hall & Playing Field committee and the Sports Club.

2.2. Poo Bins & Village Sign. A request has been made for more poo bins in the village. D.C. Penny Milnes stated that SKDC have placed labels on their litter bins stating they can be used for dog waste. She said that NKDC provide dog poo bins and she will make enquiries with SKDC. Also, it was mentioned that the village sign needs repainting. These items are to be placed on the Agenda for the next meeting,

2.3. Seat on the Village Hall Green. Request for permission to place a seat on the village hall green. This was approved. (Anyone who has walked up the hill from Caythorpe knows that a rest at the top is needed!)

2.4. Village Housing & Employment Survey by Alix Fane. PC has been provided with the results & it was asked to make these available. The newsletter would need a link to the survey results. (Some residents have stated that they thought the survey was commissioned by the PC was NOT the case & the PC was unaware of it. .

3. Signage – Ongoing. CC Alex Maughan had a meeting arranged with SKDC to discuss. No further information has been received.

4. Planning application S19/2128 -Change of use of land for the siting of 2 caravans on land off Bulby Lane. The Applicants have now lodged another Appeal (March 2021). They have been told to remove the hardstanding and return to ridge and furrow the two pitches which are now redundant but to date (4th May) they are still there. No Hearing date has been fixed.

5. Bus Shelter. Painting of the bus shelter has been carried out and it looks very smart.

6. Missing Bollards on Brant Road. On-going.

7. Tree Preservation Orders. The Parish Council has received a response from the Householder Team Planning Office and is looking further into trees with “amenity value” outside the conservation area.

8. D.C. Report. DC Penny Milne stated the Gypsy site on Bulby Lane has no date fixed for the 2nd Appeal. It is in the hands of the Planning Inspector and he will make the decision.

9 C.C. Report. CC Alex Maughan advised County Council Elections are to be held on Thursday, 6th May in the Village Hall. (Alex was re-elected as County Councillor).

10. Litter on Brant Road. Cllr. Jane Hodcroft reported she had removed a black sack of rubbish and found an address. Reported to SKDC and since then the litter problem has improved. (Several villagers have been seen litter picking on Brant Road and also thanks to Constance for her help in clearing litter).

11. New Parish Council Notice Board (included in precept) to be ordered.

12. Next Parish Council Meeting to be held on Monday, 12th July 2021 at 7.30 p.m. in Fulbeck Village Hall.

Thanks to Steve from Caythorpe for painting the “Farmer” seat on the playing field. It looks like new and much improved. Steve says he enjoys walking around the area and sitting on the seat.
